# **Road Safety**

Sadly we are still receiving complaints within the community about the parking and manoeuvring habits at drop-off and pick-up times.

One local resident wrote last week, "The problems are persistent, ongoing and are carried out by the same parents / vehicles habitually. They seem to be escalating their disregard for others and are becoming more brazen in their unacceptable and totally unsafe parking habits. Obstructed pavements present a real danger to pupils of the school and other road users alike, dropped kerbs are vital to those with mobility problems and the local residents should absolutely maintain their rights of access to and from their properties. With more suitable parking just down the road in both directions, if parents were prepared to park and then walk for just 1 – 2 minutes this would provide a much safer environment directly outside the school".

The Road Safety Team from Wiltshire Council also paid us a visit last week to carry out an independent road safety audit. They have asked that children and parents follow these guidelines:

- Use the school crossing patrol site to cross the road
- Cross in front of Bev (crossing patrol) when asked to
- Children should walk their scooters and cycles across the road
- Parents should not use the entrance to School Lane to turn around which is dangerous or park too close to that corner backing onto the zig-zags.

Yellow zig-zag lines outside schools, hospitals, or fire, police or ambulance stations indicate the length of road where <u>stopping or waiting is strictly prohibited</u>. The Highway Code states that you should keep these areas clear of stationary vehicles, <u>even if picking up or setting down children</u>.
